Circular Economy for Regenerative Tourism (CE4RT)

CE4RT (Circular Economy for Regenerative Tourism) is a project co-funded by the European Union to assist tourism SMEs in their sustainability journey.

The main objective of CE4RT is to directly support SMEs in transitioning to a circular and regenerative tourism business model thus enabling the future resilience of this sector. This is a collaborative project supporting a network of tourism SMEs across five partner European countries (**Finland, Iceland, Ireland, Poland, The Netherlands**) in the areas of Sustainable Practice, the Circular Economy and Regenerative Tourism.

The project commenced in January 2023 and will continue until January 2025 with an overall budget of 1.17 million Euro funded through the European Innovation Council and SME's Executive Agency (EISMEA) Union Single Market Programme – COSME-2021-TOURSME.

CE4RT aimed to provide financial and business support to 80 tourism SMEs across five countries through a programme (up to €8250 per SME) with the following objectives:

- 1. To develop a peer-to-peer focused approach and share knowledge, expertise and best practice among tourism SMEs, in relation to the circular economy and regenerative tourism practices.
- 2. To deliver hands on training for tourism SMEs in developing sustainability practices and influencing positive behavioural changes amongst visitors.
- 3. To provide funding towards achieving recognised sustainability accreditation/certification.





- 4. To support tourism SMEs in the adoption of sustainable best practice through one-to-one coaching to develop sustainable plans and measure carbon footprint and coaching.
- 5. To offer tourism SMEs the opportunity to participate in international networking events.
- 6. To encourage tourism SMEs and other stakeholders in the development of innovative solutions towards regenerative tourism.



As shown in the figure above, the selected SMEs took part in an online training programme between November 2023 and March 2024. Following completion of this programme, the SMEs received a digital badge "Introduction to Regenerative Tourism" from Munster Technological University.



A group of CE4RT SMEs and consortium members took part in the "Leaders & Learners Workshops" knowledge exchange event in Iceland in April 2024. This event showcased regenerative tourism practices in local businesses and provided valuable networking opportunities.

Since April 2024, the CE4RT SMEs have been engaged with their sustainability coaches, working on their sustainability action/implementation plans. Those SMEs





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who felt that it aligned with their businesses were given the opportunity to pursue certification as part of the programme.

This conference marks the final networking & knowledge sharing event of the CE4RT project, and we are delighted to welcome our EU project advisor Alan Vella from EISMEA, our CE4RT consortium partners and CE4RT SMEs from all 5 partner countries.



Sacred Heart University (SHU) is celebrating 20 years in Dingle, County Kerry, Ireland. Having welcomed a small cohort of students in the spring

semester of 2004, SHU has ensured sustainably managed growth to the point where it hosted over 500 students at the Dingle Campus in the academic year 2023/2024.

SHU has consistently committed to, invested in and developed its Centre for Irish studies and flagship study abroad program housed in Dingle. The program's expanded, innovatively renovated and remodelled campus in Dingle will open to students in the spring of 2025.

Many refer to Dingle's idyllic location as the "best of both worlds" since it provides visitors with a host of amenities, all in an authentic setting with traditional Irish culture, rich in its people, and hugely resourced in its educators.

In Irish, "An Gaeltacht" refers to the few areas in Ireland in which Irish is the community language of the people. In these areas, people work to preserve the vitality of the language and all aspects of Irish culture.









The new Institute for Sustainability and Social Justice at Sacred Heart University (ISSJ at SHU) is an interdisciplinary centre contributing to the University's mission, which is, "To embrace a vision for social justice and educate students in mind, body and spirit to make a difference in the global community."

The Institute coordinates a "sustainability across the curriculum" initiative, a national poll project focused on topics related to central themes of the institute, campus-wide sustainability reporting and assessments,

and collaborates with other departments, centres, and divisions within the university and across the broader community to further progress toward sustainability and social justice goals.

A unique intersection of three frameworks influences the ISSJ's programming: the UN Sustainable Development Goals, the Inner Development Goals, and Laudato Sí. Deirdre de Bhailís

Deirdre's key focus is to build a sustainable community by fostering an ecosystem that supports the creation of enterprise and employment on Corca Dhuibhne. Through Dingle Hub, she works on multiple projects that address the peninsula's transition to low carbon ways of living. These projects involve working in partnership to explore coastal resilience, energy communities, greener transport initiatives and anaerobic digestion solutions to address climate change.

Deirdre is a Chartered Engineer and holds a degree in Electronic Engineering from NUIG and a Masters in Engineering Science from UCC.

The Corca Dhuibhne Tourism and Hospitality Sustainable Energy Community (SEC) was established in 2023 and has 120 members who quickly accelerated progress to deliver Phase 1 Solar PV installations of 400kW in less than 12 months. In parallel, an Energy Master Plan (EMP) has been prepared and this will be launched in October 2024.

Within the EMP process, there were 3,000+ data points captured across 67 member surveys. Wattrics Energy monitoring units installed on 16 businesses to provide granular data and 21 SEAI energy audits completed. This has provided a register of over 115 opportunities and the community will now be supported to implement these through an online platform being developed through the #Enpower project.
